No. 213, DIET—In order to improve the nutritive value of the diet, without increasing the cost, the Govt. of India has made the following recommendations:—

- (a) That at least 2 to 4 ounces of fresh vegetables served daily should be of the leafy variety, such as spinach (palak), Amaranth (Chaulai Sag), Methi Sag, etc. This will supply extra calcium as also iron, the quantity of the latter in both the diets being just sufficient to meet the daily needs. Leafy vegetables can be substituted in place of same quantity of root vegetables such as potato or non-leafy types.
- (b) Some of the fresh vegetables served should be in the form of salads to be eaten raw, as this will supply Vitamin C which is usually destroyed while cooking.
- (c) At least twice a week one ounce of sprouted whole pulses (such as mung, chana, etc.) should be included in the diet. This can be substituted in place of dal or 'basin'. Sprouted pulses are a rich source of Vitamin C.
- (d) If fresh fish is available, about 2 ounces of this can be substituted in place of 2 ounces meat, twice a week.
- (e) Twice a week, at least 2 ounces of liver should be included, in place of two ounces of meat. This will supply Vitamin D which is so essential for growing children.

- No. 360, DISCIPLINE—All children travelling in School parties are subject to School discipline until handed over to parents or guardians.
- No. 361, POCKET-MONEY BOOKS—House Staff should leave their Pocket money books in the Office at the end of term.
- No. 362, FOOD—Great care must be taken by escorts to ensure that any food bought by children on their journey home is obtained only from reputable vendors or at accredited Refreshment Rooms.
- No. 363, TRAVEL—Children who are being escorted home and whose names, therefore, will not appear on the School party list must in no circumstances be permitted to leave Sanawar unless their escorts call for them. The only exceptions to this rule will be senior children going to Kasau'i.
- No. 364, LIBRARIES—Books borrowed from the Girls', Boys' and Staff Libraries should be returned by December 1st.
- No. 365, STOCK—The end of term is, I know, a very busy time for all of us but I want all Stock-holders to exercise the greatest possible check on stocks held by them. Should there be any losses a full explanation must be given as to how they have occurred. There should be a complete stock-taking in all sections of the School before term closes and Heads of Departments and Stock-holders will be responsible to me for ensuring that stock is correct and adequately safeguarded for the Vacation.
